Nodding Onion I am making seeds for the wind and rain to spread. But, I don't like being too wet.



Nodding Onion I make lots of flowers. I am happy when there isn't a lot of water.



Nodding Onion My flowers are just starting to grow. I don't mind when it is cold.



Coastal Douglas Fir

Silver Haired Bat and Pileated Woodpecker love to make homes in the bark on my trunk. Squamish people make fishing equipment out of my wood.



Coastal Douglas Fir I am making cones. Unless there is a heavy rain storm, my green, needlelike leaves, cones, and branches stay on my trunk



Coastal Douglas Fir I am making new buds to grow and they hate the snow and ice. Bald Eagles make nests on me.



Coastal Douglas Fir I am making flowers and blooming. Red squirrel and Racoon live near me. My bark is fire-resistant. I need a normal amount of water or I stop growing.



Salmonberry I am making flowers. Mason bees like to visit my flowers. My young sprouts are eaten by Squamish people and my bark can heal burns.







Salmonberry

With lots of sunshine and water, I make lots of delicious berries for Red Squirrel, Racoon and Squamish people to eat. After a fire, I quickly regrow myself. I don't like droughts – I need water.



Salmonberry I live near the river and Chinook Salmon. My roots like wet soil. When it gets cool, my leaves turn to yellow or red.





Salmonberry My branches have lots of prickles. I am dormant, not growing, when it is cold and snowy in winter. I wake up when it gets warmer.
