

WESTERN RED CEDAR



- Leaves:** green, flat, fan-like
Cones: brown egg-shaped and tiny (1cm)
Bark: stringy, tears off in long strips
Height: up to 60 metres

WESTERN HEMLOCK



- Leaves:** short, flat needles with rounded tips
and two white lines
- Cones:** small (2.5cm)
- Height:** up to 50 metres



- Leaves:** bluish-green, stiff needles that spiral around the branch
- Cones:** wavy, thin scales
- Bark:** thin, brown and can peel off in scales
- Height:** up to 70 metres

SWORD FERN



- Leaves (Fronds):** tiny leaves that grow from a central stalk, make up each frond. Fronds grow from a central location
- Spores:** yellowish spots found on the underside of leaves
- Height:** approximately 1 metre



- Leaves** thick, waxy leaves in an alternating pattern on stem
- Berry:** purple berries that resemble blueberries
- Height:** low-growing bush, less than 1 metre

DOUGLAS FIR



- Leaves** flat, green needles with a pointed tip
- Cones:** about 5–7.5cm long with trident-shaped bracts that stick out of the scales. Each bract resembles a mouse's hind legs and tail
- Bark:** thick, grooved bark
- Height:** up to 85 metres

BIG LEAF MAPLE



- Leaves:** 5-pointed, large, flat
Seed: two winged seeds
Bark: smooth, grey, with cracks appearing as the tree ages
Height: up to 36 metres
